Clery Reporting Information

The **Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act** is the landmark federal law, originally known as the Campus Security Act that requires colleges and universities across the United States to disclose information about crime on and around their campuses.

The "Clery Act" is named in memory of 19-year-old Lehigh College freshman Jeanne Ann Clery (pictured), who was raped and murdered while asleep in her residence hall room on April 5, 1986.



Jeanne's parents, Connie and Howard, discovered that students had not been told about 38 violent crimes on the Lehigh campus in the three years before her murder. They joined with other campus crime victims and persuaded Congress to enact this law, which was initially known as the "Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act of 1990."

The Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act was amended in 1992, requiring schools to afford the victims of campus sexual assault certain fundamental rights. It was amended again in 1998 to expand the reporting requirements. The 1998 amendments also formally named the law in memory of Jeanne Clery.

In 2000, the Victims of Trafficking and Violence Prevention amended the Clery Act again to include "Megan's Law" by requiring information be provided on the location of the state's public sex offender registry. It also amended the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1994 to clarify that institutions may disclose registered sex offender information without violating privacy laws. This information is accessible via a web link on the Police Services/Public Safety Division's web page.

Additional amendments to the Clery Act were made through the Higher Education Opportunity Act of 2008 by requiring that institutions develop and distribute immediate campus emergency response and evacuation procedures. Institutions are required to report bias-related hate crimes in four new categories: larceny, simple assault, intimidation, and destruction/damage/vandalism of property

In 2013, the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) made provisions for newly reportable crime categories: domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking. VAWA also added two new categories of bias applicable to hate crime reporting. These two new categories are national origin and gender identity.

Office Information

The Police Services/Public Safety Division reports to the Associate Vice President of Administrative Services of the College. The Police Services/Public Safety Division works closely with all College departments to ensure that safety policy and procedures are uniformly executed and conveyed clearly and consistently to all the college's students, faculty, and staff. Uniformed police officers provide around-the-clock patrol and services to the campus community at the Union Avenue Campus, Macon Cove Campus, and Whitehaven Center. During hours of operation at the Maxine A. Smith and Gill Centers.

Police Authority

Southwest Tennessee Community College officers are certified through the Tennessee Peace Officers Standards and Training Commission to serve as law enforcement officers in the State of Tennessee. Southwest Tennessee Community College police officers have arrest powers as provided in the Tennessee Code Annotated 49-7-118. Our officers have full arrest authority and will address anyone involved in illegal activity. The Police Services/Public Safety Division has a "Memorandum of Understanding" (MOU) with the Memphis Police Department. We share a good working relationship with them and other law enforcement agencies. When allegations of minor offenses involving violations of Southwest Tennessee Community College's Code of Student Conduct arise, the Police Services/Public Safety Division may also refer the individual to the Director of Student Development for disciplinary action.

The Police Services/Public Safety Division provides a comprehensive range of safety services to the campus community of Southwest Tennessee Community College. Our responsibilities include completing crime reports, conducting investigations, responding to medical emergencies, managing fire emergencies, handling traffic accidents, and issuing citations for parking and traffic violations.

Police Services/Public Safety is also tasked with enforcing all state, federal, and local laws, as well as college policies regarding alcohol, drug use, and weapon possession. To ensure the best possible protection for students, employees, and visitors, police officers patrol the campus using police vehicles, bicycles, and on foot.

The Union Avenue Campus, Macon Cove Campus, and Whitehaven Center have police patrols available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Officers at the Maxine A. Smith patrol during the hours the center is operational.

Reporting Crimes or Emergencies

Students, staff, and visitors at Southwest Tennessee Community College are strongly encouraged to report any crimes, suspicious activities, emergencies, or public safety incidents that may occur at any campus location. It is recommended to report incidents directly to the Police Services/Public Safety Division office where the event took place. However, you can reach out to any of the Police Services/Public Safety offices to file a report.

Once a complaint is received, an officer will be dispatched to the location to conduct an initial investigation. The assigned officer will take appropriate actions based on the nature of the incident. If further investigation is necessary or if an outside agency needs to be notified, the Police Services/Public Safety officer will reach out to the relevant law enforcement agency or make a referral.

Additionally, the Police Services/Public Safety Division documents all reported crimes on campus by preparing incident reports. These reports are maintained by the division and become part of its record-keeping process automatically.

Confidential Reporting Procedures

The college encourages victims of sexual misconduct to talk to report what happened, so they can quickly obtain the support they need while allowing the college to respond appropriately. Though the college will keep reports as confidential as possible, it cannot guarantee the confidentiality of every reported incident or complaint. The college will weigh any request for confidentiality against its obligation to provide a safe, non-discriminatory environment for all students, including the victim.

The victim may also file a report with a designated Campus Security Authority. The Campus Security Authority can report the incident to the Police Services/Public Safety Division without revealing the victim's identity. The purpose of a confidential report is to comply with a person's wishes to keep the matter private while taking steps to ensure the safety of the individual and that of others on campus. This information allows the college to keep accurate records of incidents involving students, employees, and visitors. The college can also determine crime patterns concerning locations and times, methods, or assailants and alert the campus community to potential danger. Reports filed in this manner are counted and disclosed in the annual crime statistics for the college while protecting the victim's identity.

The resources listed below are governed by statutory protections that ensure the confidentiality of individuals' information. This law strictly prohibits the disclosure of any personal details without the explicit consent of the individual involved. The only exceptions to this rule occur under very specific circumstances, particularly when there is an imminent threat to the safety of the individual or others. This means that if a situation arises where there is an immediate risk, authorized

personnel may be permitted to share critical information to protect individuals from harm.

- Reports to licensed professional counselors (including the College's Counseling Center) or professional medical healthcare providers are confidential to the extent allowed by Law.
- Counselors will maintain the confidentiality of any such reports unless required By law or court order to disclose information. For example, the Tennessee mandatory Reporting law related to abuse of minors, imminent harm to others, or subpoenas for Testimony may require disclosure of all information received. Counselors affiliated with the college may assist the complainant in receiving other necessary protection and support, such as victim advocacy, academic support or accommodations, disability, health, or mental health services, campus working, or course schedules. In some cases, requesting assistance might require the counselors to reveal identifying information to other individuals.

Accommodations

The college will take any reasonable measure to provide victims of sexual misconduct assistance in changing academic classes, transportation, and work situations if requested and reasonably available. The college will provide victims of sexual offenses with written notification about options for available assistance and request changes to academic, transportation, and working situations or protective measures. Accommodations will be provided in a manner intended to protect the victim's confidentiality to the fullest extent possible and that maintaining confidentiality will not impair the ability to provide interim or other protective measures and other supports or accommodations. Such accommodations may include, but are not limited to:

- Assist the complainant in obtaining an order of protection or restraining order as appropriate, develop Safety Action Plans for travel to and from campus, and obtain other services both on and off campus.
- Restrictions on contact ("no contact" order) between the complainant and the respondent;
- Exclusion from areas of campus;
- Providing an escort to ensure that the complainant can move safely between classes, meetings, and activities;
- Ensuring that the complainant and respondent do not attend the same classes or other necessary appearances;
- Providing counseling services;
- Providing academic support services such as tutoring;
- Arranging for the complainant to retake a course or withdraw from a class without penalty, including ensuring that any changes do not adversely affect the complainant's academic record;
- Student respondents may be placed on Interim Suspension under the appropriate circumstances pending the outcome of the investigation.
- In appropriate circumstances and consistent with the College's Human Resource policies, employee respondents may be placed on administrative leave pending the outcome of the matter. The College will provide the campus community with

information regarding existing victim advocacy programs, student financial aid assistance, counseling, and mental health services. Other services available to victims of sexual misconduct whether or not the incident is reported to campus police or criminal or civil authorities, will be provided upon request.

Campus Security Authorities

A Campus Security Authority (CSA) is a designated individual or official who, by virtue of their college responsibility for student and campus activities, and under the Clery Act, receives and reports criminal incidents to the Police Services/Public Safety Division so that the incident may be included and published in the College's Annual Security Report. They have completed training on handling and reporting crimes, victim relations and support, and related school policies. The regulations that govern the Clery Act (34 CFR 668.46) define a CSA as:

- A campus police department or a campus security department of an institution (e.g., any member of the department)
- Any individual or individuals responsible for campus security, but who do not constitute a campus police department or a campus security department. (e.g., an individual responsible for monitoring the entrance into institutional property.)
- Any individual or organization specified in an institution's statement of campus security policy as an individual or organization to which students and employees should report criminal offenses.
- An institution official with significant responsibility for student and campus activities, including, but not limited to, student housing, student discipline, and campus judicial proceedings.
- Pastoral and professional counselors are not considered campus security authorities when acting in their roles as pastoral or professional counselors.

Their positions identify these individuals at each campus location. The Police Services/Public Safety Division ensures the CSAs submit reports and statistics on any crime report they receive. Who is exempt from reporting?

Campus officials are exempt from reporting when they are acting in a pastoral or professional counselor. For this purpose, a pastoral or a professional counselor is defined as follows:

1. A Pastoral Counselor is a person who is associated with a religious order or denomination, is recognized by that religious order or denomination as someone who provides confidential counseling, and is functioning within the scope of that recognition as a pastoral counselor.
2. A Professional Counselor is a person whose official responsibilities include providing mental health counseling to members of the institution's community and functioning within the scope of his or her license or certification.

Other persons with significant responsibility for campus and student activities, and counselors who advise students and employees, are not exempt from reporting, even if the counseling is confidential.

Sexual Offender Information

Under Tennessee Code Annotated Title 40, Chapter 39, Part 2, repeat sexual offenders, violent sexual offenders, and child sex offenders are required to register with the State of Tennessee. Registered sex offenders may not be barred from attending Southwest Tennessee Community College. However, under state law, they must register with the local law enforcement agency where the college is located and provide this information to the State of Tennessee. Information about sexual offenders can also be obtained by contacting the local police department or the Police Services/Public Safety Division.

Sexual Assault Prevention and Response

The college is a community of scholars founded on mutual respect and is committed to providing a living, learning, and working environment free from sexual misconduct and harassment. The college prohibits sexual misconduct, stalking, dating, or domestic violence. Such behavior can impair or limit the educational and occupational opportunities of members of the College community and has no place in any academic environment.

According to the Higher Education Amendments of 1992 (Public Law 102-325), generally referred to as the Sexual Assault Victim's Bill of Rights, it is essential to promote the reporting of all sex-crime violations as well as to outline the procedures to facilitate the reporting of all alleged violations. Therefore, students, faculty, and staff are hereby informed of the following:

Sexual Misconduct: For this policy, "sexual misconduct" is defined as dating violence, domestic violence, stalking, and sexual assault. It may also include actions that would typically include sexual harassment.

Sexual Assault: Nonconsensual sexual contact with the complainant by the respondent, or the respondent by the complainant, when force or coercion is used to accomplish the act, the sexual contact is accomplished without the consent of the complainant, and the respondent knows or has reason to know at the time of the contact that the complainant did not or could not consent. "Sexual contact" includes, but is not limited to, the intentional touching of the complainant's, the respondent's, or any other person's intimate parts, or the intentional touching of the clothing covering the immediate area of the complainant's, the respondent's, or any other person's intimate parts, if that intentional touching can be reasonably construed as being for sexual arousal or gratification.

"Forcible" and "Non-forcible" Sex Offenses: A forcible sex offense is "any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and or against that person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent. This includes forcible rape, forcible sodomy, sexual assault with an object, and forcible fondling. Non-forcible sex offenses are acts of "unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse" and include incest and statutory rape. Depending on the circumstance, rape could be in either category.

Procedures for Reporting an Offense: In those instances where sexual assault is alleged, the victim is strongly encouraged to report the incident. The campus offices authorized to deal with a sex crime are the Vice President of Student Services, Office of Title IX, and the Southwest Tennessee Community College Police Services/Public Safety Division. When contacting one of these offices, the victim will be provided with specific information on how to proceed in filing formal charges against the accused. The Procedures for on-campus disciplinary action would be the same as those outlined in the Student Handbook for any alleged violation of the Student Code of Conduct.

If you are a victim of a sexual offense:

- Get to a safe place.
- As soon as you feel safe, call the Police Services/Public Safety Division or 911. Stay on the line and ensure the dispatcher knows where you are calling from.
- Do not shower, douche, or change or destroy your clothes.
- Do not tidy up.
- Try to preserve the evidence of the crime.
- Do seek medical attention immediately.

If, after conferring with the student, it is decided that a given incident should be referred to the civil authorities, this action will then be pursued by the Southwest Tennessee Community College Police Services/Public Safety Division. It should be stressed that the preservation of evidence is critical for criminal prosecution.

Students, faculty, and staff are hereby advised that they have the option of pursuing their allegations either through the Office of Title IX or the Southwest Tennessee Community College Police Services/Public Safety Division. Reports can be filed with both departments and will not constitute double jeopardy. Ultimately, it is the individual's decision as to whether or not they wish to pursue allegations by both authorities. Victims are encouraged to report crimes that occur off-campus to their local law enforcement authorities. However, Southwest Tennessee Community College Police Services/Public Safety Division will assist with the notification upon request.

Possible Sanctions: Depending upon the severity of the incident, those persons found guilty of a sex crime offense may be subject to a range of penalties, e.g., suspension or dismissal from the college, as well as other sanctions as outlined in the Student Handbook. The accused and the accuser are entitled to have a representative present during the campus disciplinary hearing. The hearing outcome will be made available to the accused and the accuser.

Changing Academic Arrangement: When appropriate, academic arrangements may be modified as a direct result of a sexual assault. This action may be taken when requested by the victim and if such modifications are reasonably available. These arrangements would be coordinated by the office of the Vice President of Student Services with appropriate instructional staff.

Counseling Services: Those students who become victims of a sex crime are eligible for and encouraged to take advantage of the on-campus counseling services offered by Counseling and Social Services. Referrals to other community support services will be made when appropriate.

Sexual Harassment: Southwest Tennessee Community College does not tolerate any behavior, verbal or physical contact, by an administrator, supervisor, faculty, staff member, or student that constitutes sexual harassment of any employee or student.

Sexual Assault / Rape Prevention Program

Southwest Tennessee Community College sponsors awareness events on sexual assault, harassment, rape prevention, non-forcible sex offenses, and other crimes. These events are organized and controlled by the Student Development Department, the Title IX Office, and or Police Services/Public Safety.

Crime Prevention Programs

Southwest Tennessee Community College Police Services/Public Safety Division participates through video presentations or actual appearances in all new student orientations. Discussions include providing background information on the Police Services/Public Safety Division, crime reporting procedures, how to protect oneself from crimes on campus, and services provided by the Division relating to orders of protection. Additional information presented in orientations/events may include violent crimes that have occurred in another jurisdiction but may affect Southwest students while on campus.

Campus Access

Southwest Tennessee Community College campuses and facilities are restricted to students, employees, guests, and invitees of the college, except when part or all of the campus, its buildings, or facilities are open to the general public for a designated time and purpose. All person(s) on any Southwest Tennessee Community College property are subject to all rules and regulations of the college, which apply to student conduct on campus and all federal and state laws and regulations. In addition, all persons (s) who operate motor vehicles on campus properties agree by such operation to be subject to College and Tennessee Board of Regents (TBR) rules, regulations, policies, and procedures relating to traffic and parking. All person(s) on Southwest Tennessee Community College properties shall provide adequate identification upon request to appropriate officials, police, and security personnel. Personnel and students refusing to provide such identification may be subject to disciplinary action. Other persons refusing to provide such identification shall be instructed to leave the campus. Persons who refuse to leave upon request

will be subject to lawful removal and prosecution. After hours, employees on campus properties must sign the after-hours log maintained at the Police Services/Public Safety Division office.

Students, employees, and visitors to Southwest Tennessee Community College are encouraged to report any potentially unsafe building or equipment conditions to the Police Services/Public Safety Office. In turn, Police Services/Public Safety personnel will report such conditions to the Director of the Physical Plant.

Drug/Alcohol

It is the policy of Southwest Tennessee Community College that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, possession, use, or abuse of alcohol and illicit drugs on any Southwest Tennessee Community College campus, any off-campus site, and at any College functions at off-campus locations is strictly prohibited. All employees and students are subject to applicable federal, state, and local laws related to this matter. Additionally, any violation of this policy will result in disciplinary actions as outlined in Southwest Tennessee Community College Student Disciplinary Rules, Employment Policies, and Procedures.

Institutional Sanctions

Southwest Tennessee Community College will impose the appropriate sanction(s) on any employee or student who fails to comply with the Drugs/Alcohol policy terms.

Employees: As a condition of continued employment, all employees must abide by the terms of this policy and must notify the Office of Human Resources of any criminal drug statute conviction for a violation occurring in the workplace no later than five days after such conviction. A conviction includes a finding by a state, local, or federal judicial body. Upon receiving notice that an employee is in violation or has been convicted of a violation of a criminal drug statute or alcohol abuse occurring on campus or as a part of College activities, the college will take appropriate disciplinary action against the employee. Any employee who fails to report a conviction will be subject to disciplinary sanctions. Disciplinary sanctions for failure to comply with this policy, including failure to notify of conviction, may include one or more of the following:

1. Termination
2. Suspension
3. Mandatory participation and satisfactory completion of a drug/alcohol abuse program or rehabilitation program
4. Recommendation for professional counseling
5. Referral for prosecution
6. Letter of warning
7. Probation

Students: As a condition of continued enrollment, students must abide by the terms of this policy and must notify the Vice President for Student Services of any criminal drug statute conviction for a violation occurring on the Southwest Tennessee Community College campus or at college functions at off-campus locations no later than five days after such conviction. A conviction

includes a finding of guilt, a plea of nolo contendere, or imposition of a sentence by any state, local, or federal judicial body.

Upon receiving notice that a student is violating these procedures or that said student has been convicted of violating a criminal drug statute or alcohol abuse occurring on campus or as a part of College activities, the college will take appropriate disciplinary action. The disciplinary sanction for failure to comply with this policy, including failure to notify of conviction, may include one or more of the following:

1. Expulsion
2. Suspension
3. Mandatory participation and satisfactory completion of a drug/alcohol abuse program or rehabilitation program
4. Recommendation for professional counseling
5. Referral for prosecution
6. Probation
7. Warning
8. Reprimand

Legal Sanctions

Various federal, state, and local statutes make it unlawful to manufacture, distribute, dispense, deliver, sell, or possess with intent to manufacture, distribute, dispense, deliver, or sell controlled substances. The penalty imposed depends upon many factors, including the type and amount of the controlled substance involved, the number of prior offenses, if any, whether death or serious bodily injury resulted from the use of such substance, and whether any other crimes were committed in connection with the use of the controlled substance. Possible maximum penalties for a first-time violation include imprisonment for any time up to a term of life imprisonment, a fine of up to \$100,000, supervised release, any combination of the above, or all three. These sanctions are doubled when the offense involves either:

- A. the distribution or possession at or near a school or college campus, or
- B. distribution to persons under 21 years of age

Repeat offenders may be punished to a greater extent, as provided by the statute. Further, a civil penalty of up to \$10,000 may be assessed for simple possession of a "personal use amount" of certain specified substances under federal law. Under state law, the offense of possession or casual exchange is punishable as a Class A misdemeanor. If there is an exchange between a minor and an adult at least two years the minor's senior, and the adult knew that the person was a minor, the offense is classified as a felony as provided in TCA 39-17-417. (21 USC 801, et. Seq.; TC A. 39-17-417)

It is unlawful for any person under the age of twenty-one (21) to buy, possess, or transport alcoholic beverages for any purpose unless it is in the course of employment. It is further an offense to provide alcoholic beverages to any person under twenty-one (21) years of age. These offenses are classified as Class A misdemeanors (TCA 39-15-404). They are punishable by

imprisonment no greater than eleven (11) months and twenty-nine (29) days or a fine not to exceed two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) or both unless otherwise provided by statute. The offense of public intoxication is a Class C misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment of not more than thirty (30) days or a fine of not more than \$50, or both (TCA 39-17-310).

Health Risks Associated with the Use of Illicit Drugs and the Abuse of Alcohol

Many health risks are associated with the use of illicit drugs and the abuse of alcohol, including organ damage; impairment of brain activity, digestion, and blood circulation; impairment of physiological processes and mental functioning; and physical and psychological dependence. Such use during pregnancy may cause spontaneous abortion, various congenital disabilities, or fetal alcohol syndrome. Additionally, the illicit use of drugs increases the risk of contracting hepatitis, AIDS, and other infections. If used excessively, the use of alcohol or drugs singly or in certain combinations may cause death.

Available Drug and Alcohol Counseling, Treatment, Rehabilitation Programs, and Employee Assistance Programs

Southwest Tennessee Community College has staff available for students and employees to discuss any drug and/or alcohol-related referral. Information about specific programs and activities is available through the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention program in the Counseling Office. Referrals may be made to the agencies listed on the attached sheet, or individuals may contact the agency directly.

Weapons

Weapons of any kind are prohibited on all Southwest Tennessee Community College campus locations, including, but not limited to, firearms, guns of any kind, ammunition, explosives of any

kind, bows and arrows of any kind, and knives. According to local, state, or federal law, anyone possessing or using these weapons may be subject to disciplinary action and possible arrest.

One exception to the weapon prohibition law allows full-time employees who register with the Police Services/Public Safety Department to conceal carry on campus, provided they have obtained a valid handgun carry permit.

Timely Warnings

A Timely Warning is triggered by a crime that has already occurred but poses a continuing threat. If a situation arises either on or off campus that, in the judgment of the Director of Police Services/Public Safety, constitutes an ongoing or continuing threat, a campus-wide warning will be issued. Depending on the particular circumstances of the situation, the warning will be disseminated via email, campus closed-circuit television, Rave Alert, or personally to Southwest staff and students.

The department issues Timely Warnings for incidents of:

- Murder/Non-Negligent Manslaughter
- Aggravated assault (cases involving assaults among known parties, such as two roommates fighting, which results in an aggravated injury, will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis to determine if the incident is believed to be an ongoing threat to the broader Southwest community)
- Robbery involving force or violence (cases including pickpocketing and purse snatching will typically not result in the issuance of a Timely Warning but will be assessed on a case-by-case basis)
- Sexual assault (considered on a case-by-case basis depending on the case's facts, when and where the incident occurred, when reported, and the amount of information known.)
- Major incidents of arson
- Other crimes deemed necessary by the Director of Police Services/Public Safety or their designee in his or her absence

Emergency Notification

An Emergency Notification is triggered by an event that is currently occurring or imminently threatening the campus. Suppose a serious crime, a natural disaster, or a human-made emergency occurs that poses an immediate threat to the health and safety of the Southwest Tennessee Community College community or a segment of the college community. In that case, an Emergency Notification may be issued. The types of incidents that may cause an immediate threat to the Southwest community could include, but are not limited to emergencies such as:

- An active shooter/armed intruder on campus
- A hostage/barricade situation
- A riot
- A suspicious package with confirmation of a device
- A tornado
- A fire/explosion

- A suspicious death
- Structural damage to a Southwest-owned or controlled facility
- A biological threat (anthrax, etc.)
- Significant flooding
- A gas leak
- Hazardous materials spill, etc.

Daily Crime Log

The Police Services/Public Safety Division maintains a daily crime log that lists all reported crimes. The log outlines the logistics of the crime (date, time, and location), the crime's nature, and the incident's disposition.

Crime Statistics

Under the direction of the Director of the Police Services/Public Safety Division, or their designee, crime stats are compiled daily and made available for review. In addition to crimes reported to Police Services/Public Safety Division, the Director also solicits information from the Vice President of Student Affairs and the Office of Equity and Compliance. Crime statistics in this report from off-campus venues and adjacent streets were compiled in collaboration with the Memphis Police Department and the Shelby County Sheriff's Office.

These crime statistics are substantiated by the Police Services/Public Safety Division in collaboration with the Vice President of Student Affairs, the Office of Equity and Compliance, and the Memphis Police Department. Double-counting of these crimes is avoided by an oversight process conducted by the Director of Police Services/Public Safety.

On-Campus

"On-Campus Statistics" is defined as statistics compiled from the reports filed with the Police Services/Public Safety Division of Southwest Tennessee Community College for crimes committed on the college campus or properties owned or controlled by the college within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the college and used in direct support of the college's educational purposes.

Non-Campus

"Non-Campus Statistics" is defined as statistics compiled from the reports filed with the Police Services/Public Safety Division of Southwest Tennessee Community College for crimes committed on properties owned or controlled by student organizations that are officially recognized by the college or buildings or property owned or controlled by the college used in direct

support of, or in relation to the college's educational purposes, frequently used by students, and not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the college.

Public Property (Off-Campus)

"Public Property (Off-Campus) Statistics" is defined as statistics compiled from the reports filed with other law enforcement agencies for crimes committed on all public property, including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities that are within the college's boundaries.

Crime Definitions

Murder: The willful (non-negligent) killing of a human being by another

Manslaughter: The killing of another person through gross negligence

Sex Offenses (Force): Any sexual act against another person without the other person's consent (Includes attempts)

- Sexual intercourse with another person without the other person's consent
- Sodomy with another person without the other person's consent
- Oral copulation (vaginal, anal) with another person without the other person's consent
- Rape with a foreign object (vaginal, anal) of another person without the other person's consent
- Sexual battery is the touching of the intimate parts of another person for sexual gratification without the other person's consent

Sex Offenses (No force): Any unlawful but consensual sex act with another person. (Includes attempts)

- Incest: Consensual sexual intercourse between persons related to one another within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited.
- Unlawful sexual intercourse (statutory rape) —consensual intercourse with a person under the age of consent

Robbery: The taking of personal property in possession of another, from his/her immediate presence, and against his/her will, accomplished utilizing force or fear.

Aggravated Assault: An unlawful assault upon the person of another with a firearm, deadly weapon, object, or instrument by any means or use of force likely to produce great bodily harm. (Includes attempts, whether or not an injury occurred.)

Simple Assault: An unlawful assault upon the person of another where no weapon was used and did not result in a severe or aggravated injury to the victim. (Includes attempts, whether or not an injury occurred.)

Burglary: The unlawful entry into a defined structure with the intent to commit a theft or any felony.

Vehicle Theft: The taking of a vehicle (as defined) without the consent of the owner with the intent to either permanently or temporarily deprive the owner of title or possession of the vehicle.

Arson: The willful and malicious setting of a fire to burn, causes to be burned, or aids, counsels, or procures the burning of any structure, forest land, or property.

Narcotics/Drug Offenses: The unlawful possession, sale, use, transportation, cultivation, manufacturing, or maintaining an unlawful place of storage. (Does not include driving while under the influence and or being under the influence of narcotic/illegal drugs.)

Alcohol Offenses: The unlawful possession, sale, transportation, manufacturing, furnishing of alcohol, and maintaining an unlawful drinking place. (Does not include public drunkenness or driving while under the influence.)

Weapon Offenses: With certain exceptions, the possession or control of any firearm, deadly weapon, illegal knife or explosive device, any fireworks, pellet or BB guns, switchblade knives, nunchakus, clubs, or any other deadly weapon on property owned or controlled by the college.

Hate Crimes: A criminal act motivated by bias against any person or group of persons or the property of any person or group of persons because of the ethnicity, race, national origin, religion, gender, sexual orientation, or disability of the person or group, or bias based upon the perception that the person or group has one or more of those characteristics.

Campus SaVE Act Violence Against Women Definitions

Stalking: A willful course of conduct involving repeated or continuing harassment of another individual that would cause a reasonable person to feel terrorized, frightened, intimidated, threatened, harassed, or molested, and that actually causes the complainant to feel terrorized, frightened, intimidated, threatened, harassed, or molested. "Harassment" means conduct directed toward the complainant that includes, but is not limited to, repeated or continuing unconsented contact that would cause a reasonable person to suffer emotional distress and that actually causes the complainant to suffer emotional distress. Harassment does not include constitutionally protected activity or conduct that serves a legitimate purpose.

Consent: An informed decision, freely given, made through mutually understandable words or actions that indicate a willingness to participate in mutually agreed-upon sexual activity. Consent cannot be given by an individual who is asleep, unconscious, or mentally or physically incapacitated, either through the effect of drugs or alcohol or for any other reason, or is under duress, threat, coercion, or force. Past consent does not imply past or future consent.

Sexual Assault: Nonconsensual sexual contact with the complainant by the respondent, or the respondent by the complainant, when force or coercion is used to accomplish the act, the sexual contact is accomplished without the consent of the complainant, and the respondent knows or has reason to know at the time of the contact that the complainant did not or could not consent. "Sexual contact" includes, but is not limited to, the intentional touching of the complainant's, the respondent's, or any other person's intimate parts, or the intentional touching of the clothing covering the immediate area of the complainant's, the respondent's, or any other person's intimate parts, if that intentional touching can be reasonably construed as being for sexual arousal or gratification.

Domestic Violence: Violence against a person when the complainant and respondent:

- Are current or former spouses;
- Live or have lived together as a spouse or intimate partner;
- Are related by blood or adoption;
- Are related or were formally related by marriage; or,
- Are adult or minor children of a person in a relationship described above

Violence includes, but is not necessarily limited to:

- Inflicting, or attempting to inflict, physical injury on the complainant by other than accidental means;
- Placing the complainant in fear of physical harm;
Physical restraint;
- Malicious damage to the personal property of the complainant, including inflicting, or attempting to inflict, physical injury on any animal owned, possessed, leased, kept, or held by the complainant; or,
- Placing the complainant in fear of physical harm to any animal owned, possessed, leased, kept, or held by the complainant.
- Matters involving non-intimate individuals, i.e. dormitory roommates who live together, may be addressed by the Code of Student Rights and Responsibilities at the discretion of the college.

Dating Violence: Violence against a person when the complainant and respondent are dating, or who have dated, or who have or had a sexual relationship. "Dating" and "dated" do not include fraternization between two (2) individuals solely in a business or non-romantic social context. Violence includes, but is not necessarily limited to:

- Inflicting, or attempting to inflict, physical injury on the complainant by other than accidental means;
- Placing the complainant in fear of physical harm;
- Physical restraint;
- Malicious damage to the personal property of the complainant, including inflicting, or attempting to inflict, physical injury on any animal owned, possessed, leased, kept, or held by the complainant;
- Placing a complainant in fear of physical harm to any animal owned, possessed, leased, kept, or held by the complainant.

Clery Act Reporting Requirements

Under the Clery Act, Southwest Tennessee Community College must publish crime statistics in a campus crime report for each campus location by October 1 each year. The campus crime report must be made available to the students, staff, and faculty of the College, prospective students, and employees upon request. The Annual Security Report must be distributed in two ways: giving a copy directly to each individual or by direct mailing to each individual through email, campus mail, U.S. Postal Service, or a combination of these methods. The Annual Security Report may be posted on the internet or intranet website as long as it is reasonably accessible to current students, employees, and prospective students and employees. Information on how to access the crime report must be provided. The college must provide a paper copy of the report upon request. This request does not have to be in writing, and the institution may not charge for the information. The institution must provide a direct link to the Annual Security Report.

- A prospective student is an individual who has contacted an eligible institution requesting information about admission to the institution.
- A prospective employee is defined as an individual who has contacted an eligible institution requesting information concerning employment with that institution.

The annual crime report for Southwest Tennessee Community College may be accessed on the College website: <https://www.southwest.tn.edu/compliance/clery-act.php>, or the Police Services/Public Safety website: <http://www.southwest.tn.edu/police>, or the information may be accessed by request at any campus police office of Southwest Tennessee Community College. The college must report on the following offenses under the Clery Act requirements: murder and non-negligent manslaughter, negligent manslaughter, forcible and non-forcible sex offenses, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft, arrests, and referrals for disciplinary actions. To provide a more accurate description of crimes committed on the properties owned or controlled by Southwest and since these offenses also directly affect the students, employees, and visitors to the college, the college has added simple assault, domestic assault, theft from a motor vehicle, theft/larceny, and arson offenses to the crime statistics in the crime report.

Dormitories or Residential Facilities

Southwest Tennessee Community College crime statistics must include statistics for dormitories or residential facilities on Southwest Tennessee Community College-owned or controlled properties. Southwest TN Community College does not own or operate any dormitories or residential facilities, so this report has no statistics.

Non-Campus Properties

Southwest Tennessee Community College Police Services/Public Safety Division solicits crime statistics from law enforcement agencies with jurisdiction over the college's non-campus properties.

Emergency Response Procedures

Notifying the Campus Community of an Immediate Threat to Health or Safety:

The decision to notify the community is determined on a case-by-case basis. The initial recommendation is made by the Police Services/Public Safety Division. The notification recommendation is typically made to the President or the Vice President of Financial and Administrative Services. The person(s) responsible for sending the official notification to the campus community include, but are not limited to, the Director of Police Services/Public Safety and the Director of Marketing and Communications. If the incident requires the broader community notification, the information will be communicated via:

- text [Rave-Alert],
- college email,
- college website,
- college phone system,
- college social media outlets,
- local media.

In addition to Police Services/Public Safety notification, the local Police or Sheriff's Departments are contacted to act in concert with the College Police Services/Public Safety Division in maintaining order, isolating buildings, and controlling situations. The Police Services/Public Safety Division will activate the Emergency Notification procedures by dispatching officers via two-way radio, dispatching runners to each affected area to make the appropriate notifications, and using the methods listed above.

Communicating the Confirmation of an Emergency:

Confirmation of emergencies is generally communicated to the broader community by way of local media outlets. The College Police Services/Public Safety Division confirms and

communicates emergencies based on observations, news media, and information received and investigated. In the case of dangerous weather, the weather service will be monitored. Again, this information is communicated by way of text [Rave-Alert], college email, college website, college social media sites, and the audible announcement system located throughout the campuses. News media and local law enforcement authorities can disseminate the information to the broader community. Our emergency response and evacuation system is conducted annually using marked drills at various campus locations.
